

Herlong Youth Is Killed Instantly In Car Wreck

SUSANVILLE, Lassen Co., Sept. 26.—Ted Tidwell, 16, of Herlong was killed instantly late yesterday when the car in which he was riding overturned on Highway 395, seven miles south of here.

The highway patrol reported Tidwell and Eddie Shepherd were passengers in a car driven by Alvin D. Shepherd, who apparently lost control of the vehicle.

Tidwell was a student in the high school here.

Jeep Accident Takes Life Of Guardsman

RENO, Nev., Sept. 26.—James Milroy, 17, Sparks High School student and member of the Nevada National Guard, was injured fatally at the entrance of the Reno Army Air Base when the ammunition jeep he was driving went out of control and landed in a ditch.

A companion, Harold Keoke of Reno, was injured slightly.

Injured Driver Faces Highway Patrol Citation

ROSEVILLE, Placer Co., Sept. 26.—The highway patrol reported Merrill J. Butler of Santa Cruz was hurt in a traffic accident on US Highway 40, east of Colfax, Placer County. A car driven by Butler failed to make a curve, went out of control, climbed an embankment and overturned. He was cited for reckless driving, speeding, driving on the wrong side of the road and not having an operator's license.

Yolo Traffic Wreck Hurts Claim Life Of Transient

WOODLAND, Yolo Co., Sept. 26.—Jose Franco, transient worker, died in the Yolo General Hospital yesterday of injuries suffered in a truck accident on August 30th.

The accident occurred when a truck in which Franco was riding failed to negotiate a curve and overturned on its side. Franco and five others were thrown to the pavement.

Husband Is Freed In Death Probe Of Wife

LODI, San Joaquin Co., Sept. 26.—Robert Ray Miller, 42, was released from the San Joaquin County Jail on order of Justice of the Peace Hugh Tye, for lack of evidence in the death of his common law wife, Patsy.

Miller had been held since September 17th, the day after Mrs. Miller, 34 year old carnival worker, was found injured on Ham Lane on the edge of Lodi. She died a few hours later.

125 Attend Teachers Institute In Colusa

COLUSA, Colusa Co., Sept. 26.—Approximately 125 elementary and high school teachers of Colusa County attended the annual institute here.

Work Proceeds As Scheduled On Delta Channel

The regional office in Sacramento of the federal bureau of reclamation reported today work on the Delta-Cross Channel near Walnut Grove is progressing according to schedule.

The channel, a major link in transporting Sacramento River irrigation water to the San Joaquin Valley through a pumping plant in Tracy, San Joaquin County, is being excavated from the river to Snodgrass Slough. The slough is a branch of the Mokelumne River and is connected with the 1,000 miles of old river channels in the delta district.

Excavation work on the 3,400-foot channel, the bureau reported, is about half completed. Installation of the 30 x 60 foot radial gates is about 20 per cent finished. The George Pollock Company of Sacramento is the contractor for both phases of the work.

The channel is 425 feet wide and 19 feet deep and is designed to carry 4,600 second feet of water.

Hitchhiker Is Sought For Theft Of Automobile

PLACERVILLE, El Dorado Co., Sept. 26.—Floyd V. Post, city police and the highway patrol are looking for a youth, about 19, who wears a red cap. When last seen he was driving Post's 1942 coupe in which he had been left while Post went into the bank.

Post explained he had picked up the youth as a hitchhiker and had offered him work when he reported being out of funds.

Mendocino Acts To Settle Case Of Young Slayer

UKIAH, Mendocino Co., Sept. 26.—District Attorney James E. Busch said today a determination is expected to be made within two weeks in disposing of the case of 15 year old Helen Joyce George, who fatally shot Samuel C. Wallitsch, 74, because she said she had an "urge to kill someone."

Busch yesterday filed a formal charge of murder against the girl and also filed an affidavit of mental illness to legalize her confinement in a state asylum until her sanity is determined and disposition made of the murder charge.

The prosecutor also said an investigation is being made to determine if the case is subject to transfer to Sonoma County. He explained juvenile matters, in some instances, may be transferred to the legal home of the accused. Her parents are separated and both are in the Santa Rosa area. She had been living with a grandmother on a ranch near Willits, Mendocino County.

Court attaches said the affidavit of mental illness bears no relation to the criminal charge and may come up for a hearing next Friday. Judge Lillburn Gibson will be required to appoint two doctors to examine Helen and if she is found insane she may be committed. If she is dissatisfied with the finding she will have the right to a jury trial.

MARYSVILLE, Yuba Co., Sept. 26.—The building committee of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Marysville has announced the parishioners have agreed to employ the B. H. Lawson Company of Rockville Center, N.Y. to conduct a fund raising campaign for a new parish school.

The school would cost approximately \$200,000 and would mean the razing of a Superior California historical landmark, the nearly century old Notre Dame Convent.

Butte Wins Honors At LA County Fair

OROVILLE, Butte Co., Sept. 26.—Fred R. Platt, Butte County agricultural commissioner, advised the board of supervisors this county swept into new honors at the Los Angeles County Fair in Pomona.

Butte's exhibits won 161 awards, with 122 first places.

Woman Is Accused Of Butte Cattle Rustling

OROVILLE, Butte Co., Sept. 26.—Sheriff's deputies are continuing an investigation of a charge of cattle theft filed against Mrs. Patricia Sinclair of the Bloomer Mountain district. The charge was signed by W. C. Daniels of Wyandotte, who runs cattle near the Sinclair cabin.

Mrs. Sinclair was booked on a charge of grand theft, but was released on her own recognizance pending the investigation. Under Sheriff Gordon Fairchild said she admitted having cut up the beef found in her home, but said she had come across the shot heifer waste the meat.

AFL Lumbermen Vote To Accept 5 Cent Raise

REDDING, Shasta Co., Sept. 26.—Members of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, American Federation of Labor, last night voted to accept a 5 cent hourly wage increase resulting from month long negotiations between the union's Northern California District Council and the employers' industrial relations committee.

Luther Sizemore, Jr., head of the union local, said the increase, effective September 16th, raises the minimum hourly wage rate in 21 lumber operations in Shasta and part of Trinity County to \$1.57 1/2. Eleven hundred workers are affected.

Grass Valley Railroad Man Dies In Capital

GRASS VALLEY, Nevada Co., Sept. 26.—Thomas J. Kennedy, 78, veteran railroad man, who worked with the Nevada County Narrow Gauge for 52 years, died last night in the home of his daughter, Mrs. T. C. Jones in Sacramento.

Most of his time with the railroad was spent as stationmaster in Grass Valley.

He was a native of Kentucky and was the father of Howard of Sacramento, Mrs. Virginia Phinney of San Francisco and Mrs. Jones of Sacramento.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 10 AM in the Grass Valley St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

He died in the fields and did not want to be buried in the cemetery.

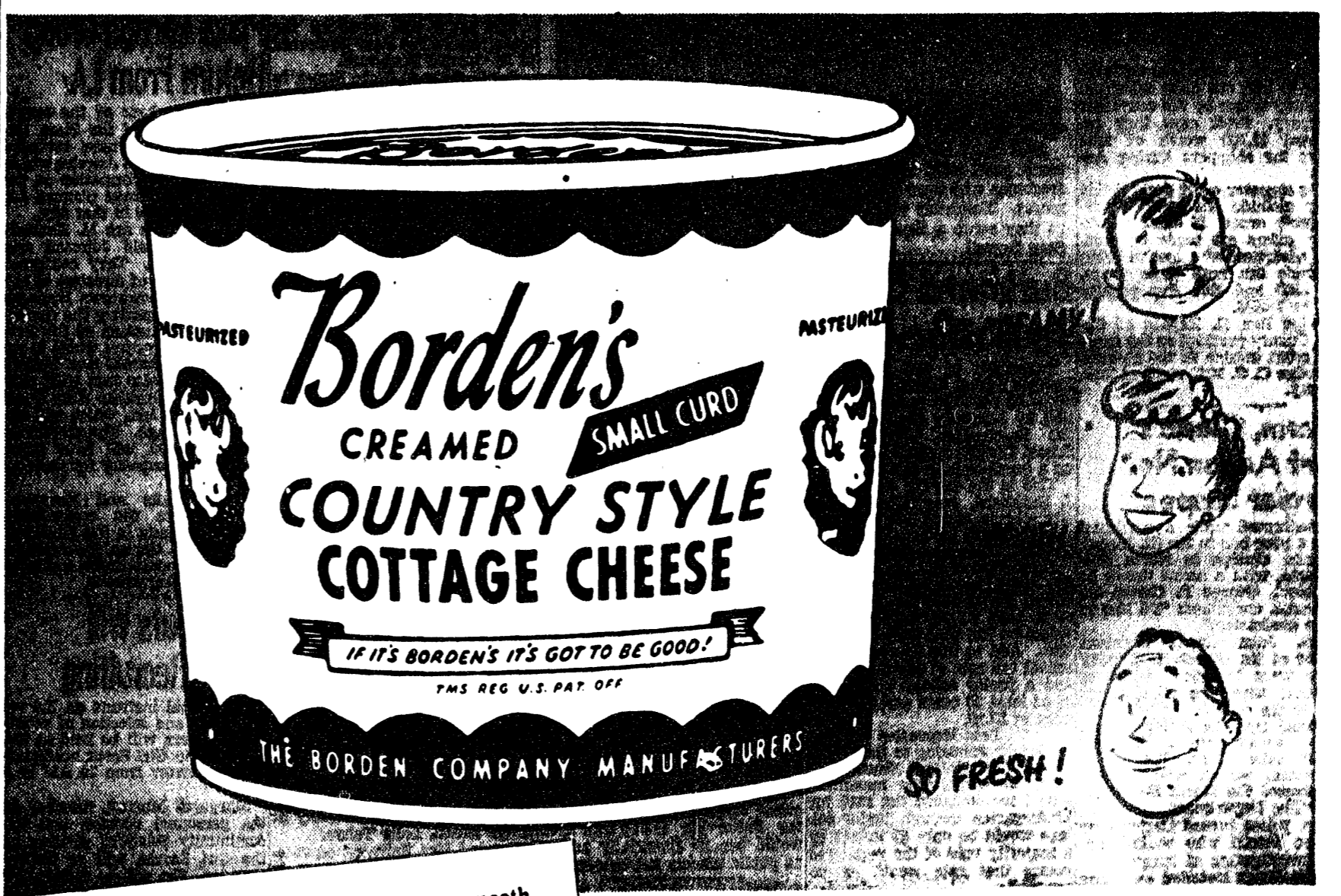
Interment will be in the family plot in Wheatland at a date to be announced.

Shasta Board Favors Two Judge Proposal
REDDING, Shasta Co., Sept. 26.—The county board of supervisors unanimously is in favor of the establishment of a second superior court department and the appointment of a second full time superior judge for Shasta County.

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
