Stephen B. Quigley, Mobile, Ala.

MOBILE, April 18.—[Special.]—Stephen B. Quigley died this morning at half-past 7 o'clock of Bright's disease, after a lingering illness. He was born in Easton, Pa., Feb. 8, 1818, and when quite a child removed with his parents to New York city. After a residence there of ten years the family removed to Mobile in 1834, and he entered into partnership in the building and contracting business with his father. He continued in this business until 1843, when, with his brother, the late Albert M. Quigley, the firm of S. B. & A. M. Quigley was formed. This firm engaged in the manufacture of brick, and the business was continued until the death of his brother, A. M. Quigley, about three months ago. Mr. Quigley was twice married, his first wife being a Miss Hackett of Easton, Pa., by whom he leaves one son, Wm. H. Quigley of New Orleans. His second wife was Miss Mary Mountain of this city, who with one son, Albert M. Quigley, and two daughters, Mrs. Frank Owen and Mrs. St. John, survive him. Mr. Quigley was a life long member of the Presbyterian church, and during his residence in Mobile has been connected with the Government Street Presbyterian church, of which he was one of the oldest members.

Shortly before the death of her husband this morning, Mrs. Stephen B. Quigley was stricken with paralysis, and now lingers between life and death.

Mrs. Eliza Hindspeth, Opelousas, La.
